This largest gathering of scholars and students in Slavic, East European and related studies will be held this year in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Time: November 20 (Thursday) - 23 (Sunday), 1986.

Place: Hyatt Regency Hotel at Loui-

siana Superdome, Poydras at Loyola Avenue, New Orleans, La. 70140. Phone: (504) 561-1234. The convention is hosted by the Southern Slavic Conference. Prof. Rochelle Ross (Loyola U., Emeritus) is the Honorary Chairman of the convention.

The American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies is the largest organization of this kind in America and the world. It has over four thousand members; its headquarters are at Stanford University, Cal. Beside many other activities the AAASS sponsors annual conventions each time in a different place. In 1985 it hosted the III World Congress for Soviet and East European Studies in Washington, D. C. during October 30 to November 4 in Sheraton Hotel. The last time an AAASS convention



was held in the South was ten years ago in Atlanta. Before that one took place in Dallas, Texas in 1972.

The Association for Croatian Studies has participated in AAASS National Conventions since 1978, when it became AAASS' affiliate. Last year the ACS took a very active part in the program of the III World Congress.

The ACS Participation at the New Orleans Convention:

First of all, our Business Meeting will be held on Friday, November 21 during 8:30-10:30 a.m. Since only a Preliminary Program (AAASS Newsletter, May 1986) is available so far, the location of this meeting and our panel sessions will be published in the printed final Program of the Convention. It will be distributed to all registered for the convention at the time of its opening.

Our panel session CROATIAN HUMANISM IN RENAISSANCE EUROPE will be held on the same day, Friday in the afternoon: 1:30-3:30.

Convention rates at Hyatt Regency Hotel: \$56/night single or double. Reservation requests received by the hotel after October 19 will be confirmed only if space is available.

Pre-registration for the Convention through the AAASS is \$40 for members; \$10 more at the start of the convention.

Saturday, Nov. 22 - instead of the traditional banquet - a riverboat dinner cruise will take place during 7:30-11:00 p.m. We hope that many of our members will use this attractive event to experience the real New Orleans, Mississippi River, jazz, etc. Charge per persom: \$28.

If in any way possible we would like to organize a Croatian get-together, either for a luncheon, or for a supper Friday night. Our only member in New Orleans is Prof. Miloš Vujnović who for many years taught at Delgado College. He also published a book about the Croatians and other South Slavs in Lousiana on the occasion of the centennial of the United Slavonian Benevolent Association: 1874-1974. This is the oldest Croatian fraternal organization in America. he book Yugoslavs in Louisiana (Gretna, La.: Pelican Publishing Co..





1974; 246 pp., illus. deals mostly with the Croatian immigrants in Louisiana. More than a hundred years ago they were pioneers in oyster industry. Their descendants are now in the mainstream of life in Louisiana and neighboring states where the oldest American Croatian settlements are located.

Very likely, the AAASS National Convention will attract over two thousand people.

Over three thousand attended the last convention in Washington where dozens of Croatians were also present. We hope to see quite a few in New Orleans. There will be an exhibit of Croatian books in a rented

booth in the room with other book exhibitors.


We are looking forward to another successful ACS participation at a "Slavic Convention."

ANTE KADIĆ: DOMOVINSKA RIJEČ II KNJIŽEVNO-POVIJESNI OGLEDI



Profesor Ante Kadić, nakon završenih studija u Splitu, Rimu, Bazelu i Ženevi te službe kod Ujedinjenih naroda u Parizu i Beirutu, došao je u Ameriku te 1953. godine dobio posao na slavenskom odjelu Kalifornijskog sveučilišta, u Berkeley-u. Od 1960. godine sve do mirovine bio je profesor slavenskih književnosti na Indianskom sveučilištu, u Bloomingtonu. Da bi se usavršio u raznim


slavenskim jezicima i upoznao njihove književnosti, Kadić je nekoliko puta boravio u Jugoslaviji, Bugarskoj i Sovjetskom Savezu, a putovao je također u Poljsku i Čehoslovačku.

lako je neko vrijeme predavao i suvremenu rusku književnost, Kadić se zadnja dva desetljeća bavi izučavanjem južnoslavenskih književnosti. Prva njegova knjiga u Americi je bila Modern Yugoslav Literature: An Anthology with Biographical Sketches (Berkeley, 1956). Napisao je pregled suvremene srpske književnosti tContemporarv Serbian Literature, The Hague 1964) te dvije knjige eseja o svim južnoslavenskim književnostima (From Croatian Renaissance) to Yugoslav Socialism, The Hague, 1969; South Slavic Literatures, New Haven, 1986). Ipak je glavnu pažnju Kadić posvetio proučavanju književnosti svog hrvatskog naroda, bilo u domovini bilo u tuđini. Njegova Hrvatska čitanka (Croatian Reader with Vocabulary) doživjela je dva izdanja (Berkeley, 1956; The Hague, 1960). Iste godine kad i Čitanku, Mouton je objavio Kadićev pregled suvremene hrvatske književnosti (Contemporary Croatian Literature, The Hague, 1960). Isti izdavač je tiskao knjigu eseja o Križaniću, koju je Kadić priredio skupa sa profesorom Eekmanom (Juraj Križanić, Russophile and Ecumenic Visionary, The Hague, 1976). U Columbia Dictionary of Modern European Literature (New York, 1980) Kadić je obradio pemaest najboljih suvremenih hrvatskih pisaca. Kadićevo dosad najbolje djelo, na kojem je radio više godina, svakako je njegova opsežna knjiga o predaji slobode unutar hrvatske književnosti (The Tradition of Freedom in Croatian Literature, Bloomington, 1983).

Budući da živimo među strancima koji nas slabo poznaju, smatramo dužnošću ih obavijestiti o našim političkim težnjama i kulturnim dostignućima. Zbog toga Kadić surađuje u raznim slavističkim časopisima i sudjeluje na slavističkim kongresima, bilo u Americi bilo u Evropi, gdje obično drži predavanja sa područja hrvatske književnosti. U zadnje doba ga često pozivaju da drži predavanja o hrvatskoj renesansi, pa se stoga sav predao proučavanju hrvatskih renesansnih Latinista te namjerava o njima objaviti monografiju na engleskom.


Kadić je u par navrata bio po više mjeseci u Jugoslaviji, ali je iz nje dva puta bio istjeran (1967, 1978). O tim svojim "izgonima" on je pisao nadugo u svojim Dnevnicima. Mislimo da bi bilo poželjno da oni ugledaju svjetlo dana: iako su pisani od čovjeka koji nije upleten u dnevnu politiku, oni rječito ukazuju na stvarno stanje u domovini.

Ova druga knjiga Kadićevikh eseja o domovinskim književnicima sadrži nekoliko radova autobiografske prirode, ali iz njih također izbija ono bitno kod Kadića: njegov čitki i odnjegovani stil, uvijek protkan visokom kulturom i dubokom povezanošću sa Hrvatskom. O čemu god pisao, Kadić nikad ne zaboravlja rodnu mu grudu.

Ne možemo bolje zaključiti ovaj prigodni osvrt o Kadićevu znanstvenom radu u Americi nego riječima profesora W. Edgertona, dugogodišnjeg predsjednika američkih Slavista: "Teško je pronaći nekog naučnog radnika u Americi koji bi bio djelatniji od Ante Kadića na području južnoslavenskih književnosti... Ono što ga čini izuzetnim među Balkanistima, to je njegova objektivnost. Kao što ga njegovo američko građanstvo ne smeta da bude ponosan na kulturna dostignuća njegove Hrvatske, tako isto njegov hrvatski odgoj ga ne sprječava da proučava i piše o ostalim južnoslavenskim književnostima".





THE C.A.A. THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL GENERAL ASEMBLY

For the first time in its existence the Croatian Academy of America held its annual general assembly outside of New York City. It took place on Saturday, May 24, 1986 at Hyatt Lincolnwood Hotel, 4500 W. Touly Ave., Lincolnwood, Ill. 60646. This is a suburb of Chicago.

The Midwest Chapter of the CAA under the leadership of Dr. Jure Krišto organized this gathering. The business meeting started at 2:00 p.m. Dr. Jerome Jareb, the President of the CAA opened it and gave tribute to the deceased members: Stanislav Borić, Josip Vl. Bosiljević, and Miroslav Gal: he also remembered the passing away of the writer Antun Bonifačić. After Dr. Edward S. Yambrusic was elected chairman of the assembly, the President gave his report and a historical survey of Academy's past. This was followed by reports of the Recorder and of the Executive Secretary. She. Dr. Marija K. Tuškan gave a detailed summary of past year's activities. New members are joining and in spite of losses due to death of members the Academy is growing in numbers. The issue of the Journal of Croatian Studies (CAA's annual publication) dedicated to Ivan Mestrovic attracted a great deal of attention of foreign scholars and institutions. Several chapters of the CAA are quite active (Toronto, Chicago, and Los Angeles).

Mr. Vinko Kužina, the Treasurer reported that the financial situation is quite satisfactory. More members are paying their dues regularly; they also gave substantial donations. One of the editors of the <u>Journal Mr. Karlo Mirth</u> stated that the next issue will deal with the topic of the Croatian language. One of the main topics on the agenda was the discussion of rules and by-laws for individual chapters. All the points of the proposed draft were discussed, voted on, and finally accepted. At the end the old Executive Committee was re-elected for another year.

On the same day starting with 7:00 p.m. a banquet was held in the hotel. In his speech Dr. Fedor Cicak gave tribute to the late Rev. Francis H. Eterovich and his pioneering role in cultural activities of the Croatian immigrants until his untimely death in Chicago in October 1981. Dr. Eterovich edited two volumes of Croatia: Land, People, Culture published by the University of Toronto Press. He prepared the contents of the third volume that is now under the editorship of Rev. Nikola Dugandžić, the successor of Fr. Eterovich at the Croatian Guardian Angels parish in North Chicago. Rev. Dugandžić informed the present at the banquet about the difficulties hampering the publication of Vol. III of Croatia. On the whole this gathering in Chicago was very well attended and successful. Present beside many members from Chicago were quite a few from various cities in America and Canada. Congratulations and good luck in the next successful year!

The construction of the room is in progress and will be open to the public September 28,1986. Furnishings needed include library shelves, portable display cases, audia-visual equipment, tables and chairs, desk, microfilm machine, computer, portable exhibiting equipment, etc. On that day you will be able to visit the Meritage Room and if you wish to do so, donote for needed items.

The Croction Heritage Museum will be the cultural center of the Croatian community. It can't be founded or exist without the support of the entire Croatian community particularly those members who care enough about their Croatian cultural heritage to preserve it and transmit it to future generations.

We are appealing to you for contributions for the purchase of the furnishings for the museum and library. Your donation will be tax deductible and a receipt will be forwarded to you within a month of reseiving your gift.

Your support may be expressed in the following manner:

- 1. You may invest in the Croatian home by purchasing a 5,1,000.00 share and designating it for the Creation Heritage Museum. [This will go for the construction of the room)
- 2. You may donate funds to purchase furnishings and equipment for the Heritage Room.

Umro najveći hrvatski povjesničar

U Zagrebu je 25. ožujka o. g. u 84. godini umro prof. dr. Jaroslav Šidak, umirovljeni profesor novije hrvatske povijesti na Filozofskom fakultetu u Zagrebu.

Prof. Šidak se rodio u Beču 1903. godine od roditelja českog porijekla, ali je od šeste godine živio u Zagrebu i uvijek s ponosom isticao da se osjeća Hrvatom i hrvatskim znanstvenikom.

Punih 40 godina je radio kao sveučilišni profesor i odgojio brojne naraštaje vrsnih povjesničara. Predavao je i nekim Gradišćanskim Hrvatima i bio u vezi s njima. Uređivao je uspješno, gotovo 4 desetljeća "Historijski zbornik" koji je pod njegovom rukom postao najugledniji hrvatski i jugoslavenski časopis, osobito cijenjen u inozemstvu.

Napisao je desetak knjiga i na stotine članaka i drugih prioga. Među knjigama treba istaknuti one o hrvatskoj povijesti 19. stoljeća, o crikvi bosanskoj, o revoluciji 1848, te posljednju koja se zove Kroz pet stoljeća hrvatske povijesti. U Enciklopediji Jugoslavije bio je urednik za hrvatsku povijest i napisao članke o svim značajnijim ličnostima novije hrvat-

ske povijesti, posebno o povjesničarima.

U tisku mu je knjiga o hrvatskoj povijesti od 1790. do 1847., a u rukopisu je ostala Povijest hrvatske historiografije i još nekoliko radova.



Prof. Šidak je udario čvrste temelje poslijeratnoj hrvatskoj povijesnoj znanosti i bio nje najugledniji i najplodniji predstavnik. Bio je sjajan predavač, izvrstan metodolog i odgojitelj, pravi zanesenjak svoga posla. Zato njegovi studenti i doktorandi s ponosom ističu da su svršili "Šidakovu školu".



This is an obituary on Prof. Jaroslav Sidak, the most eminent Croatian historian who died in Zagreb on March 25, 1986 at the age of 84.


We reprint it here as it originally appeared in the language of the Burgenland Croatians.

How bright you've grown;


O harbor sentinel, America's image as the world's friend, Stand tall, a pillar at the border of our land!

Place: the Park Plaza Hotel.










Strawberry Hill in Kansas City, Kansas - an old Croatian settlement - where our artist Marijana Grisnik grew up and immortalized it in her paintings.

Especially valuable for the Croatian history in this country is Carl R.

Magnuson's "Marijana: A Biography." (pp. 1-15). This beautiful, unique and valuable work is a tribute to the art of Marijana Grisnik and a document on Croatian contribution to the arts and culture of America. The text on the next page from:

Despite the potent influence of the melting pot, the United States still contains many ethnic communities which preserve the rich heritages and distinctive customs of other lands. One such community is Strawberry Hill in Kansas City, Kansas, where the language and traditions of Croatia — now part of Yugoslavia — have lived on since the turn of the century.

Painter Marijana Grisnik has spent her life in Strawberry Hill and through her talent shares the unique look and character of her world with her other fellow Americans. A self-taught artist in the primitive style, Marijana paints from memory scenes of life on Strawberry Hill — dancing the kolo at a Croatian wedding; making povitica, a traditional Christmas and Easter bread; buying Croatian delicacies at the local grocery store — as well as fantasy images filled with Croatian folklore and religious symbols. Her vividly colored paintings celebrate a close-knit community that has never forgotten its European roots.

"Marijana's World" contains 41 oil paintings with commentary texts by the artist; posters and comprehensive catalogues are also included. Lecture and Croatian folk music and dance components may be added, pending a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. The exhibit has been arranged by the Kansas State Historical Society.

IMAGES OF STRAWBERRY HILL: WORKS BY MARIJANA GRISNIK

The Kansas State Historical Society is proud to announce the traveling exhibit "Images of Strawberry Hill: Works by Marijana Grisnik." The exhibit features 37 paintings by the Croatian artist, Marijana Grisnik. The exhibit is co-sponsored by the Kansas Arts Commission's Touring Visual Arts Program and the Mid-America Arts Alliance Visual Arts Program. Partial funding is provided by the National Endowment for the Arts.

Marijana paints her memories of growing up in Strawberry Hill. This area of Kansas City, Kansas lies on the bluffs overlooking the place where the Kansas and Missouri rivers merge. The area is closely identified with the Slavs, especially the Croatians, who began settling the area in the late 19th century. Marijana has strong ties both to Strawberry Hill and the ethnic heritage of its people. Born on Strawberry Hill in 1936, Marijana was raised within the traditions of the Strawberry Hill community.

Marijana is concerned with preserving her cultural heritage. Since 1970 she has painted over one hundred canvases chronicling the history and folklife of Strawberry Hill. Her paintings depict such activities as making kobasica (sausage), gathering grain on the railroad tracts, a Croatian wedding, and Good Friday at St. John's Church. Through her canvases this self-taught artist has become the storyteller of this ethnic community.
